Double-crested Cormorant

Phalacrocorax auritus

This member of the family Phalacrocoracidae (Cormorants and Shags), is part of a unique order found worldwide. Most birds in this order have a bare throat patch ("gular patch"), and the nostrils have evolved into dysfunctional slits, forcing them to breathe through their mouths. Considered a pest in the Great Lakes region of eastern North America, the species is declining in BC.

Characteristics

A large diving bird with a stocky body, long neck and moderately hooked beak. Breeding adults are iridescent, greenish-black with orange-yellow skin on the face and gular patch, eyes are aqua coloured. Juveniles and non-breeding birds are browner in colour. The double crest (“shag”) is only found on adults early in the breeding season.
